

Building Illinois Bioeconomy student receives national biofuels scholarship

EDWARDSVILLE - Building Illinois' Bioeconomy Consortium (BIB) student Donald Jackson has received the prestigious Kathy Bryan Memorial Scholarship from BBI International, a company that produces and manages globally recognized bioenergy publications and events.

A student at Southeastern Illinois College (SIC) in Harrisburg, Ill., Jackson was awarded one of two \$2,000 memorial scholarships. They are distributed annually to students, who are pursuing degrees that may lead to a career in the ethanol industry and who are working to build a sustainable future that reduces carbon emissions.

"This award reflects the consortium's commitment to connecting students with indemand careers that directly contribute to Illinois' and the nation's economic and environmental sustainability," BIB Project Manager Courtney Breckenridge said. Jackson has worked as a board operator for Cardinal Ethanol near Union City, Ind. since 2008. He takes classes online while working full time. Except for a two-week break in October 2015, he has completed two assignments every week since April 2015. He believes that his continued education will improve the possibility of moving up in the company.

SIC is a member of SIUE's BIB consortium, which is comprised of five higher education institutions spanning the state of Illinois. In addition to SIUE and SIC, partners include Lewis and Clark Community College (L&C) in Godfrey, Lincoln Land Community College (LLCC) in Springfield and Carl Sandburg College (CSC) in Galesburg. The consortium was established in 2014 through a \$9,956,011 award by the U.S. Dept. of Labor's Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training (TAACCCT) initiative.
