Louis A. Blackorby, 89, died at 4:40 a.m., Wednesday, October 13, 2010 at the Jerseyville Nursing & Rehabilitation Center.

He was born in Hamburg on Sept. 12, 1921, the son of the late Herman H. and Grace Edith (Cardwell) Blackorby.

A U.S. Army World War II veteran, he participated in the Normandy Beach Invasion. A mechanic by trade, he had previously worked at Carter Brothers in Alton, was self employed for a time at Blackorby Garage in Dow. He retired in 1983 as a mechanic with the State of Illinois Department of Transportaion in Jerseyville.

A member of the Dow Southern Baptist Church, he was also instrumental in the formation of the Dow Fire District and had formerly served as their captain, and was a member of the Fieldon Masonic Lodge #592 as well.

He married the former Virginia Hope Hoyt on April 23, 1941 in St. Charles, Mo. and together they have shared and enjoyed 69 years of marriage.
