She had her routines, as she would go to every Tuesday morning for coffee with her "coffee ladies" and every Friday to church and then to get her hair done. Pat loved going to the Barefoot for her birthday, picking peacons, and putting up her Christmas tree with her grandchildren. She also kept "spare presents" in case one of her children or

grandchildren brought someone to Christmas with them. Pat enjoyed helping her friends and often would go clean their home or cook them a meal. Pat was a devoted mother and grandmother. She was very proud of her family and loved to brag on them every chance she was given. Her house is filled with pictures of her family that she has taken over a lifetime filled with precious memories spanning many holidays, birthday, and everyday occasions. She would pick up her grandchildren from school almost every day, and often took them for ice cream and rides around Delhi Farms. One of her favorite pastimes involved watching her grandchildren play sports and participate in dance. She loved playing with them as well, and would often play baseball and kickball with her youngest grandchildren, Taylor, Carley, Ethan and Quinn. She played these games up until the months before her passing, running the bases and all. All of these attributes, Pat would be most proud of her devotion to her church and God.
