


## William Nagy

William Bernard Nagy, age 90 died at 5:35 a.m. on Saturday, December 13, 2014. Born June 19, 1924 in Divernon, IL, he was the son of Frank Nagy Sr. and Terez (Csak) Nagy. Bill was raised in the Catholic Children's Home in Alton, graduated from Marquette High School attended Shurtleff College and SIUE. He served in the U.S. Navy in the South Pacific during WWII as a gunner's mate.
